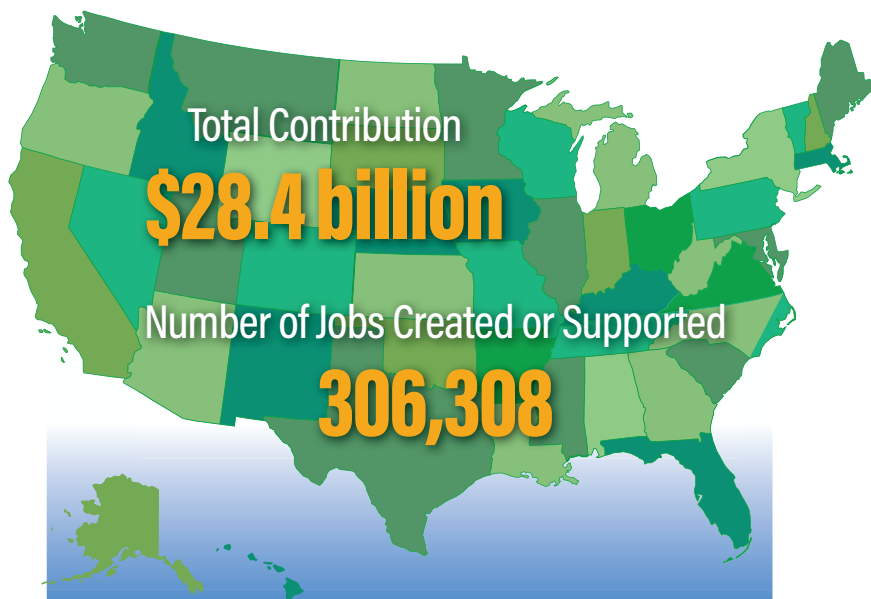

Benefits from International Students



International students studying at U.S. colleges and universities contribute **28.4 billion** to the U.S. economy and support **306,308 jobs***. For every three international students, **one U.S. job is created** and supported by spending occurring in the higher education, accommodation, dining, retail, transportation, telecommunications and health insurance sectors.

The economic contributions of international students are in addition to the immeasurable academic and cultural value these students bring to our campuses and local communities.
